Beschreibung
European security policy comprises the security policy of European nation-states and the Common Foreign and Security Policy (CFSP) of the European Union. The latter is shaped by EU member states, EU Commission and parliament, and achieved considerable institutional clout and relative importance especially in the last twenty years. The former nation-state policies have substantially cooperated and converged within the framework of EU and NATO policies, but also continue to diverge due to different national preferences. The questions are: what drives EU and European nation-state security policies and why do they converge on some issues but differ in other cases? The seminar investigates the ideational, material and institutional foundations of European security policies by focussing on the EU-level as well as on the security policies of the major European powers France, Germany, Italy, Poland and the UK. These actor's policies will be analyzed through three theoretical lenses: neorealist (power), institutionalist (EU rules) and domestic politics (material interests, societal ideas) approaches. The case studies for the examination of European security policies include Transatlantic Relations, Russia's war on Ukraine, the Middle-East and China's rise.
