Multilateralism in Crisis? Challenges for Global Governance (IIP, Teil II; PFA, Teil II) Dr. Aukje van Loon Di 12-14 Uhr
Beschreibung
Over the last decades, global governance has been questioned on several grounds. The global financial crisis, the Eurozone crisis, emerging powers' aspirations, and Western anti-establishment voters produced the following important changes and challenges: (1) the shift of powers from Western to non-Western countries replacing the old North-South divide; (2) the defiance of US and European authority in multilateral organizations, and (3); 'the globalisation fatigue' manifested by the surge of anti-establishment movements' popularity, discontent with domestic politics and efforts to regain society's control over market forces. For these reasons, questions regarding the challenges and future role of global governance are more important than ever. The focus in this seminar will be on these three challenges encompassing various types of policy fields (e.g. trade, finance, security, development and environment). Students will gain knowledge on theoretical backgrounds focussing on international power (neorealism) and institutions (institutionalism), domestic interests and ideas (liberalism and societal approach) to empirically investigate traditional and new actors' role and performance as well as the international, institutional, and domestic driving forces shaping success or failure of governance in a global setting.
