The second decade of the 21st century has harbored a growing trend among scholars from a variety of disciplines to place empathy at the center of the debate on human psychology, culture, ethics, economics, and political solidarity. Within the field of social and cultural psychology, empathy is hypothesized to be a benefactor in favorable human behaviors such as altruism and care for others. This hypothesis is also shared by many mental-health practitioners today, who consider empathy to be part and parcel of their psychotherapeutic technique. However, several contemporary scholars within the field of psychology, sociology and cultural theory have recently come to critique the immaculate appreciation of the notion of empathy. The Empathy & Society Colloquium will focus on the critique of empathy as the "grand theme of our time" (de Waal, 2010). Tackling its hyper-polysemy and re-evaluating its potential applications within the fields of social and cultural psychology, ethics, politics. and psychoanalytic psychotherapy. Presentations in the colloquium will explore the 'dark side' of empathy, offering a more nuanced perspective on the contemporary focus empathy.


